

An automated electronic defibrillator (AED) is located in the fellowship hall, in the corner nearest the front door.



PLEASE BE SEATED

While most of the world marks the passage of time form January through December, Christians have kept their own calendar of events for centuries. This Christian year is a way of remembering key events in the life and ministry of Jesus Christ.

Among the Sundays of the year, Easter Sunday has the place of prominence. Easter is a victory celebration, a time for all Christians to proclaim boldly their faith in a risen and victorious Savior.

The death and resurrection of Jesus changes everything. Believers now do not have to fear death as the end of the story. The hopelessness of this sin-broken world is overtaken by the sure hope of eternal life with Christ in body and soul. God had been talking about Easter from the beginning hinting and preparing His people to receive it. And now it is here for us to celebrate each week. Each Sunday is a little celebration of Easter: the Lord's day on which He rose from the dead.

Certain Hope for Uncertain Times

There is no doubt that there are many things that are uncertain in our lives and in our world. There seem to be even fewer things we can depend on than usual. In the middle of such uncertainty, we have a variety of hopes—things we wish would happen. There is no guarantee, however, that our wishes will come true.

Easter gives us something better. It gives sure and certain hope to the things God has promised. Both his promises about this life and the next are dependent on Jesus' resurrection from the dead. This is why the truth of Easter is so important. It assures us that he can and will keep his promises. We don't need to wish. We can know. The resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead gives certain hope for uncertain times.

As you prepare to worship your Lord today, spend a few quiet moments in prayer before the service. Review the Scripture readings, the service notes, and pray this prayer:

O God, you made the dawn of this most holy day shine with the glory of our Lord's resurrection. Grant that we who have been raised from the death of sin by your life-giving Spirit may worship you in sincerity and truth; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen.

EASTER PROCLAMATION

PLEASE STAND

On the first day of the week, very early in the morning, the women took the spices they had prepared and went to the tomb. ² They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, ³ but when they entered, they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus. ⁴ While they were wondering about this, suddenly two men in clothes that gleamed like lightning stood beside them. ⁵ In their fright the women bowed down with their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? ⁶ He is not here; he has risen!

Luke 24:1-6

Leader: Alleluia! Christ is risen!

Congregation: He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

Dear friends in Christ, today we come together to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord. Let us draw near to him in worship and in praise, in our thoughts, and in our prayers.

CONFESSION OF SINS

Our God is a holy God, and we are unholy sinners. Before we meet our God, our status before him must change – or he would destroy us. We confess our sins, trusting God's promise to forgive us (See 1 John 1:9). Our Lord wants to forgive our sins. He sent Jesus to make us "at one" (atonement) with God by dying on the cross for our sins. The pastor makes the sign of the cross to remind us we are forgiven only because Jesus died on the cross.

On this day God the Father raised His only Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, from death. In doing so, he showed his acceptance of our Savior's sacrifice for our sins. "For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (*Romans 6:23*). Let us confess our sins to God our Father and receive His forgiveness, that we may be reconciled to Him and to one another.

(Silence for reflection on God's Word and for self-examination.)

Most gracious heavenly Father,

we come to You burdened by the sins for which Your Son died. We are ashamed of our sinful thoughts, words, and deeds; in all humility we ask for Your mercy. You have raised our Lord Jesus from death and promised us eternal life because of the faith Your Holy Spirit has worked in our hearts. For the sake of Your Son's innocent suffering and death and His glorious resurrection, forgive us, renew us, and lead us to eternal life. Amen.

On this most holy festival day, on which our Lord conquered death and the grave, as a called servant of Christ, and by His authority, I joyfully forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the (†) Son and of the Holy Spirit.

SERMON: 1 Corinthians 15:19-26

NOTES:

The Sermon is the Word of God, proclaiming the living voice of the Gospel to God's people. The preacher is the appointed representative who illuminates the Scripture for the congregation and applies it to our contemporary situation. He is neither lecturer nor entertainer, but a link through whom the Holy Spirit brings law and gospel to bear upon the hearts and minds of the worshiper and enlivens their faith and life.

SONG OF PRAISE: #719 Christ Has Arisen, Alleluia (st. 1,5)



This Tanzanian Easter hymn reminds us that the empty tomb is a message that transcends all time and culture.

THE WORD

We sit at the feet of Jesus, like Mary did, to hear the Word (Luke 10:42). Here is time for meditating, strengthening, forgiveness, instruction, and response.

SALUTATION

This greeting has deep roots in Christian worship. Because God has forgiven us, we have a special bond with our Lord and with each other as Christians. Pastor and congregation express this bond of fellowship with a blessing for each other – that the Holy Spirit would bless you as you hear God's Word and that he would bless the pastor to preach God's Word with power.

PRAYER OF THE DAY

Following an ancient outline, the prayer of the day asks for one specific blessing. This prayer changes each Sunday, according to the Bible readings for that Sunday.

Let us pray:



PLEASE BE SEATED

HYMN OF THE DAY: #152 | Know that My Redeemer Lives

The Hymn of the Day is assigned to this day because of its rich content and connection to the day's Gospel.





GOSPEL: Mark 16:1-8

The empty tomb is the end of fear.

The congregation stands for the reading of the Gospel. (In the past, soldiers put down their weapons and kings removed their crowns when the Gospel was read.) Christ—his life, his words of law and Gospel, his suffering and death, his resurrection, his assignment to the Church, his promise to return—is the center of the Gospel. The faithful have waited for this moment, this reading. They stand in reverence. After hearing the Gospel, we respond with a joyful acclamation of praise.

The Gospel according to St. Mark, chapter 16.

Glory be to you, O Lord!

¹⁶¹ When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so that they might go to anoint Jesus' body. ² Very early on the first day of the week, just after sunrise, they were on their way to the tomb ³ and they asked each other, "Who will roll the stone away from the entrance of the tomb?"

⁴But when they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had been rolled away. ⁵As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man dressed in a white robe sitting on the right side, and they were alarmed.

⁶ "Don't be alarmed," he said. "You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid him. ⁷ But go, tell his disciples and Peter, 'He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him, just as he told you.'"

⁸Trembling and bewildered, the women went out and fled from the tomb. They said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid.

PLEASE BE SEATED

FIRST READING: Job 19:23-27

The empty tomb is the end of accusations.

The First Reading is typically taken from the Old Testament and occasionally from the Book of Acts. In it we learn of God's mighty words and deeds with the Old Testament Church, the people of Israel.

- ²³ "Oh, that my words were recorded, that they were written on a scroll,
- ²⁴that they were inscribed with an iron tool on lead, or engraved in rock forever!
- ²⁵I know that my redeemer lives, and that in the end he will stand on the earth.
- ²⁶ And after my skin has been destroyed, yet in my flesh I will see God;
- ²⁷ I myself will see him with my own eyes—I, and not another. How my heart yearns within me!



PSALM OF THE DAY: Psalm 118

Psalm 118 is the believer's joyful song of praise to God for all of his mighty acts, the greatest of which is Christ's resurrection from the dead.

The Psalm is the most ancient part of our worship service. While most of our liturgy is 1,800 years old, Jews have been singing Psalms in worship for 3,000 years.



The leader will introduce the refrain and sing the verses of the song.

The congregation is invited to join in singing the refrain as indicated.

Leader: Refrain.

Congregation: Refrain.

Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; his mercy endures forever; Let the house of Israel say: "His mercy endures forever."

Refrain.

The hand of the Lord has struck with pow'r, his right hand is exalted,

I shall not die, but live anew, declaring the works of the Lord.

Refrain.

The stone which the builders rejected has become the cornerstone, the Lord of love and mercy has brought wonder to our eyes!

Refrain.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 15:19-26

The empty tomb is the end of death.

The Second Reading of Scripture is from the New Testament letters of the apostles or the Revelation to St. John. It stresses Christian faith and Christian living as a response to the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

¹⁹ If only for this life we have hope in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

²⁰ But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. ²¹ For since death came through a man, the resurrection of the dead comes also through a man. ²² For as in Adam all die, so in Christ all will be made alive. ²³ But each in turn: Christ, the firstfruits; then, when he comes, those who belong to him. ²⁴ Then the end will come, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father after he has destroyed all dominion, authority and power. ²⁵ For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. ²⁶ The last enemy to be destroyed is death.
