## **WELS Archives construction nearing completion**

---

**W**ork on preparing the space that will house the WELS Archives is progressing well. The remodeling of the area on the lower level of the Center for Mission and Ministry, Waukesha, Wis., is scheduled to be completed by the end of July. Once construction is completed, the shelving and furniture for the archives space will be installed. The actual move of the historical documents, books, and artifacts from Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary will begin in September. The move will not only free up needed space at the seminary, but it will also place the archives into a climate controlled environment that will help to preserve the collection.

Another feature of the newly created space will be a visitor center. The center will be the first place that visitors will see when they tour the Center for Mission and Ministry. Using video and displays, the center will offer an overview of the synod's history as well as give visitors a glimpse of the various ministries carried out by the synod.

Susan Willems, the new WELS archivist, has begun the task of sorting and classifying the archives material and making plans for the move. Willems is well qualified for the task, having worked in the archives department at the University of Denver. She is a graduate of Wisconsin Lutheran College and earned her Master of Library and Information Science degree from the University of Denver in 2013.

Once completed, this project will carry out the resolutions of at least three synod conventions, which called for the relocation of the synod archives to a suitable new home.

## **Supporting humanitarian aid work in missions**

---

**E**ach year, WELS Christian Aid and Relief distributes humanitarian aid funds offered by God's people expressing Christian love for others in need. The aid provides clean

water, medical care, life skills classes, basic needs, and more for people around the world and in the U.S.

Rev. Bob Hein, chairman of WELS Christian Aid and Relief, says,

“This used to be exclusively World Missions projects, and now more and more of the Home Mission fields, especially in cross-cultural situations, are bringing us projects as a way to reach other cultures.”

This year, funding is being provided to churches in Las Vegas, Toronto, Chicago, and Texas that have or are developing programs to help immigrants as they settle in the U.S.

Hope Lutheran in Toronto, Canada, for example, operates the Hope food bank and offers humanitarian assistance to newcomers in its neighborhood. This can take the form of food, rental help, and assistance with other matters pertaining to their transition into the area. This project helps Hope Lutheran open the door to share the gospel with new families in the area.

Hein says, “They’re all just trying to find a way to bridge the gap to reach people in other cultures, and there’s so many humanitarian needs in those communities.”

Around the world, humanitarian aid enables access to new and emerging fields, even in places where WELS doesn’t or can’t have missionaries. And it is a show of good will to areas where a WELS presence might be a risk.

“Christian Aid and Relief can be at the front lines. When we’re reaching an emerging field, we have some humanitarian aid to show that we care,” says Hein.

## WELS Hmong conference uplifts members

**M**ore than 165 attendees and their children gathered around the Word at the WELS Hmong National Conference, held July 8-10 at Immanuel Hmong, St. Paul, Minn. Hmong pastors and laymembers from congregations in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Kansas, Alaska, California, and even the WELS mission in Thailand strengthened their faith through worship and Bible study and learned more about each other’s ministries.

“The encouraging moment is when I see members who live in places where we do not have a church or the church is very small come and see that we have many people worshiping and praising the Lord,” says Rev. Pheng Moua, pastor at Immanuel Hmong and conference planner. “The gathering is uplifting to the members and will encourage their walk with Jesus Christ.”

Moua started this conference about ten years ago at his church. It usually is held every other year, sponsored by the larger WELS Hmong congregations.

“We do not want our members to hunger and envy what other church bodies can cater to their members,” says Moua. “When we are surrounded with our own people, we teach our members that we can be united to nurture and teach our people to become a strong church body.”

Worldwide in WELS, 25 Hmong pastors serve eight ministries in the

United States and 15 congregations and preaching stations in Thailand and the surrounding area.

“It is a blessing to gather with fellow Christians to receive their support, since the Hmong culture and many Hmong are anti-Christian,” says Rev. Keith Free, Home Mission administrator and conference attendee. “I believe it helps to re-energize their desire and commitment to sharing the Word.”

The next Hmong National Conference will be held in 2018. Home Missions and Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary also are sponsoring an Asian Conference for pastors and spiritual leaders in October at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, Mequon, Wis.
